

# Crash Culture

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The countries of China, Taiwan, Singapore, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Philippines, Indonesia, and Thailand are brought together for the first time in an integrated and systematic work outlining each country's cultural themes, cultural practices, and preferred conflict resolution mechanisms. The new "ADR" processes and centuries-old mediation and conciliation systems used in these countries are compared with the evolving mediation and ADR systems, including facilitation in North America and the West. While dominant discourses claim that we have made significant progress away from racial bigotry, there is no shortage of evidence that inequitable ideologies of race prevail. Similarly, mainstream cinematic productions have mass appeal, yet tend to demonstrate and cement the racial ideologies that circulate in society. As such, they can be used either for the propagation of dominant ideologies or in the development of critical consciousness. *Crash Politics and Antiracism* does the latter, understanding the award-winning film *Crash* as an especially interesting pedagogical site, for while to many it offers a fresh analysis of race and racism, the antiracist analyses in this book suggest that it recycles oppressive understandings of race. The essays in this collection, written from a variety of racial locations, provide readings of *Crash* that seek to disrupt the movie's subtle messages and, more importantly, some of the intractable liberal notions of race that perpetuate racial inequity. Riley also analyzes the cultural narratives that evolved in films and in books around the events on the day of the crash and the lives and deaths of its “angel patriot” passengers, uncovering how these representations of the event reflect the myth of the authentic American nation—one that Americans believed was gravely threatened in the September 11 attacks. Ballard and David Cronenberg (<Crash>), Quentin Tarantino (<Death Proof>) and Sarah Lucas, among others, are shown to pursue these ideals, even as developments in modern cities and telecommunications continue to change the nature of speed and technology. While the first half of the twentieth century was concerned with the celebration of speed and acceleration, the car crash has now become an obsession of contemporary culture. Vidal concludes that our attraction to the car crash reflects the contemporary way of life in the West, which is defined by a Futurist technophilia, a Romantic longing for a higher meaning and an undeniable infatuation with the automobile.

In the beginning blues, jazz folk and rock for the most part reflected a particular cultural tendency and appealed to a fringe social element. Today the landscape of music and art has altered radically. I felt a new Eurock book had to be put together examining the ways technology has mutated the creative process, the way we listen to music and the culture of music itself. I asked a few friends from diverse music areas and different experiences to write something along these lines hoping that maybe we could come up with a collection of articles that would shed some light on all of this. The books main contributors' are: My old friend Joe Carducci who was instrumental in running Systematic Record Distribution and SST Records, wrote a piece about his coming of age musically. Now a screenwriter/ author, his definitive tome Rock and the Pop Narcotic is essential reading. Michael Beinhorn contributes an insightful piece on the making of music today. Michael was nominated for a Grammy as Producer of the Year on albums by Courtney Love and Marilyn Manson. He also worked with



Herbie Hancock and developed the Ultra Analog Recording format. My partner in various Eurock projects, electronic experimentalist and ePub guru Doktor Bob, contributes an in-depth piece on the historical conflict for profit and corporate control between Technology & Music. Renowned Portland, OR artist Tom Cramer writes about how the love of music played a major part in shaping his long, successful career in Art. From South of the Border Samuel Máynez Champion violinist with the Mexico City Symphony Orchestra and cultural historian did two articles: an Interview with Luis Perez Ixoneztli, plus chronicle of his own Opera adaptation, Vivaldi en Tenochtitlan, about the life of Motecuhzoma II. Two pioneering French musician/journalists Dominique Grimaud & Gérard Nguyen both contribute insights and articles about their work past & present working in the experimental music scene in France. There is also a text from 1973, translated from the original German and published here for the first time, written by the late Florian Fricke on the power of music and sound to connect people to the sacred nature of life. In addition, there is an Interview with Ulrich Rützel. He was one Germany's top music producers who founded one of the very best original German Indie labels, Erdenklang. My old pal and eclectic music maker Fizzè also waxes prosaically about his own particular form of Rasta wango tango and cosmic musical enlightenments place in the world of today. The historical scope of this book ranges from Plato; Musical innovation is full of danger to the State, for when modes of music change, the fundamental laws of the State always change with them - The Republic. Then it moves on to 1960s Youth Culture with Revolution With Guitars, Not Bombs - Mick Farren. From there it takes a quantum leap forward to the state of music creativity today with Innovation & Appropriation. Followed by the history of how we appreciate and listen to music now and may well on into the future in How Tech Ate the Music Industry. These topics only scratch the surface of the 65 articles and 335 pages in the book. Included are Special Features filled with personal histories, opinions and musical flashbacks. Today there has indeed been a Revolution carried out in both Music & Culture. In a sense, Plato truly was a visionary, and for a time during the 1960's there was music made by some artists who truly did inspire people to keep hope alive. After reading Music & the Second Culture Crash and what the various writers have to say you can draw your own conclusions about how it all turned out. Artists, writers, and filmmakers from Andy Warhol and J. G. Ballard to Alejandro González Iñárritu and Ousmane Sembène have repeatedly used representations of immobilized and crashed cars to wrestle with the conundrums of modernity. In Crash, Karen Beckman argues that representations of the crash parallel the encounter of film with other media, and that these collisions between media offer useful ways to think about alterity, politics, and desire. Examining the significance of automobile collisions in film genres including the "cinema of attractions," slapstick comedies, and industrial-safety movies, Beckman reveals how the car crash gives visual form to fantasies and anxieties regarding speed and stasis, risk and safety, immunity and contamination, and impermeability and penetration. Her reflections on the crash as the traumatic, uncertain moment of inertia that comes in the wake of speed and confidence challenge the tendency in cinema studies to privilege movement above film's other qualities. Ultimately, Beckman suggests that film studies is a hybrid field that cannot apprehend its object of study without acknowledging the ways that cinema's technology binds it to capitalism's industrial systems and other media, technologies, and disciplines. Despite the ubiquity of automobility, the reality of automotive death is hidden from everyday view. There are accident blackspots all over the roads that we use and go past every day but the people that have died there or been injured are not marked, unless by homemade shrines and personal memorialization.  
Nowhere on the planet is this practice as densely actioned as in the United States. Road Scars is a highly visual scholarly monograph about how roadside car crash shrines place the collective trauma of living in a car culture in the everyday landscapes of automobility. Roadside shrines—or road trauma shrines—are vernacular memorial assemblages built by private individuals at sites where family and friends have died in automobile accidents, either while driving cars or motorcycles or being hit by cars as pedestrians, bicyclists, or motorcyclists. Prevalent for decades in Latin America and in the American Southwest, roadside car crash shrines are now present throughout the U.S. and around

the world. Some are simply small white crosses, almost silent markers of places of traumatic death. Others are elaborate collections of objects, texts, and materials from all over the map culturally and physically, all significantly brought together not in the home or in a cemetery but on the roadside, in drivable public space—a space where private individuals perform private identities alongside each other in public, and where these private mobilities sometimes collide with one another in traumatic ways that are negotiated in roadside shrines. This book touches on something many of us have seen, but few have explored intellectually.
