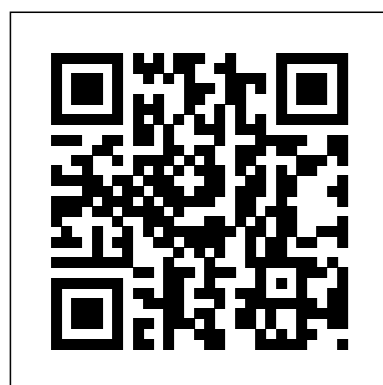


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This book examines the study of natural history in the Spanish empire in the years 1750-1850. During this period, Spain made strenuous efforts to survey, inventory, and exploit the natural productions of her overseas possessions, orchestrating a series of scientific expeditions and cultivating and displaying American fauna and flora in metropolitan gardens and museums. This book assesses the cultural significance of natural history, emphasizing the figurative and utilitarian value with which eighteenth-century Spaniards invested natural objects, from globe-trotting elephants to three-legged chickens. It considers how the creation, legitimization and dissemination of scientific knowledge reflected broader questions of imperial power and national identity.

From the very outset of his theological career, Scheeben had cherished the ambition of making the drab naturalistic world glow again in the light and beauty of grace, of bringing back to the awareness of men the glorious truth that they are God's children. In the first of his major books, Nature and Grace, he describes the supernatural as a sharing in the nature of God. This same theme, the splendor of our supernatural life, is the leading idea of all his works. He thought that a deep appreciation of the mysteries revealed by God was so important that he consecrated the tireless powers of his genius to the task of bringing out their beauty and force, and of emphasizing their meaning for the daily life of man. He insisted that these mysteries are the richest treasure of our spiritual inheritance and that theology is the inspiration of the fullest lie open to use-supernatural life with Christ and in Christ.

High-level diplomatic negotiators and grassroots peace activists alike blame religious extremists for acting as "spoilers" of rational negotiation, and have often attempted to neutralize, co-opt, or marginalize them. In *Producing Spoilers*, Joyce Dalsheim explores the problem of stalled peacemaking by viewing spoilers not as the cause, but as a symptom of systemic malfunctions within the concept of the nation-state itself, and the secular constructs of historicism that support it. She argues that spoilers are generated as internal enemies in the course of conflict and used to explain why processes of peace and reconciliation fail. In other words, peacemaking efforts can work to produce enmity. Focusing on the case of Israel and Palestine, Dalsheim shows how processes of conflict resolution, diplomacy, dialogue, education, and social

theorizing about liberation, peace, and social justice actually participate in constructing enemies, thus limiting the options for peaceful outcomes. Dalsheim examines the work of politicians and diplomats as well as scholars and grass-roots level peacemakers, drawing on her research and her own experience as an activist for peace. She identifies a number of common techniques and assumptions that help to produce spoilers, among them the constraints of the narrative form and how storytelling is employed in conflict resolution, and the idea of anachronism, which prevents theorists and activists from seeing creative possibilities for peaceful coexistence. Dalsheim also looks at the limits of territorial solutions and the consequences of nationalism - the context in which spoilers of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict are produced. She contrasts that nationalism with current theorizing on flexible citizenship and diasporic identity. The book culminates by moving beyond national enmity and outside conventional peacemaking to clear a space in which to think about alternative forms of negotiation, exchange, community, and coexistence.

The ultimate outcome after America leaves is inherently unpredictable given the multitude of actors there, but one thing is sure: the war did not go as America had hoped. Although the al-Qa'eda leader Osama bin Laden was killed and no major attack on the American homeland was carried out after 2001, the United States was unable to end the violence or hand off the war to the Afghan authorities, which could not survive without US military backing. *The American War in Afghanistan* explains why the war had such a disappointing outcome. These are the general propositions that will occupy our attention in subsequent remarks, though additional matters may be considered before closing. The Book of Mormon makes no mention of Assyria or of its people, while the reader's attention will often hereafter be directed to Assyrian architecture when comparisons are instituted between Babylonian arts and those of the ancient Americans; and hence some further preliminary remarks are necessary; for the question naturally arises as to the grounds upon which this course can be taken consistently. Answering, the fact is recalled that the Babylonians used bricks very largely in their building operations, while the Assyrians turned to stone as the most convenient material; and, because of the consequent difference in durability, the Babylonian structures are now generally little more than heaps of debris, while those of the Assyrians are far better preserved, and

good examples of their works have been exhumed - far better as a rule than what is found among the Babylonian remains. This fact would not, however, justify some of our future comparisons did we not know that the Assyrians were largely mere imitators of the Babylonians architecturally and generally. Accordingly it transpires that when we view specimens of the arts of the former, we get a fair idea of what those of the latter were also. As the book delves into the supernatural reality, it searches the claimed truths of the Holy Bible to determine its communication about the origin, the present and the future of species. As in most questions, the truth of the future can be better predicted by a study of the past. An in depth study of the past and the present reveals an obvious presence of the supernatural. Our problem is that the supernatural cannot be understood using natural knowledge and that is very frustrating to those of us trained to be able to understand anything. At this point in our reasoning, we need to admit that the only reason that we feel that we have to understand everything, is that we want to be God, to not only understand, but to control our future and that of those around us. If that is our future, as you should be able to imagine, there will be chaos, wars and death. But if the words of God as expressed in the Bible are true, there is a future of peace, comfort and joy!

No International Congress of Entomology would now be complete without a symposium on insect life-cycles. The latest Congress, held at Vancouver, BC (Canada), in July 1988, was no exception, with a symposium on the genetics, evolution, and coordination of insect life cycles organized by Bill Bradshaw and Valerie Brown.
